

Top Ten indoor air cleaning plants!

Areca Palm – this palm is pretty at first but keep an eye out.... It needs moisture and light. If it isn't happy, you'll know. The tips will brown and the leaves will drop. Spider mites like this plant. Keep it clean!

Reed Palm – this one can handle lower light conditions and would make a decent addition to your lower light rooms.

Dwarf date Palm – this is a great looking mini date tree! It can tolerate lower light and some abuse. IE: forgetting to water once in a while.

Boston Fern – Boston Fern a truly elegant Indoor plant. It likes humid environment and can be used as an accent plant for your bathroom

Pothos – are tough, adaptable plants. Their climbing/trailing habit makes them extremely decorative. The green variety can handle lower light while the variegated needs brighter light.

English Ivy – English Ivy is versatile indoor plant, grows in bright and indirect light. These can be grown in hanging baskets. Great vining plant.

Australian sword fern – Gorgeous! Filtered bright light, 65 °F during the day, high humidity, needs to be constantly moist. Challenging to grow well.

Peace lily – Peace Lily is another of the most popular Indoor Plants. It can grow in very low light situations. It is adorned with white blossoms and produces dark green foliage. You'll know when this guy needs water!

Rubber plant – my all time favorite for low light conditions and will take abuse. By that, I mean can tolerate indifference! Just keep those leaves clean for their air purifying properties. Nearly completely disease and pest free.

Weeping Fig - Weeping fig is the most common indoor tree used in homes, and is available in green or variegated forms. They're beautiful plants, but aren't always easy to grow because they're sensitive to environmental changes. As a result, you'll need to avoid placing weeping fig plants near drafts. You also will need to provide consistent light intensity and watering regimes. Weeping figs generally prefer moderate to warm temperatures in the home, and tolerate medium to very high-light situations. For best results, keep soil evenly moist and avoid low-light situations. Variegated forms of this plant require more light than the solid green forms.
